



<p>LGBTI</p>	<p>Mentioned: 8 times</p> <p>Yes: This issue is comprehensively covered</p> <p>This document has an entire section that addresses the needs and rights of LGBTI individuals in relation to ICPD</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Human rights • Right to health services • Encouraging greater evidence generation for LGBTI populations • Promotion of universal access to health for LGBTI <p>In addition, LGBTI individuals are classified as a key populations</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Freedom from Forced Sterilization 	<p>Mentioned: 1 times</p> <p>Yes: The issues is also covered by discussing the issues around violence against LGBTI individuals</p> <p><i>Bearing in mind that violence against girls, women and LGBT persons (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transsexual), in particular sexual violence, is a critical indicator of marginalization, inequality, 14 exclusion and gender discrimination against women and affects their autonomy, self-determination, individual and collective health and the exercise of human rights,</i></p>	<p>Mentioned: Zero</p> <p>The word LGBTI is not mentioned anywhere in the document however recommendation 7 makes reference to guarantee equality before the law and non-discrimination for all people regardless of sexual orientation (mentioned only once)</p> <p>It highlights the prevention of hate crimes based on any form of identify</p>



<p>Abortion laws and restrictions</p>	<p>Mentioned: 13 times</p> <p>The issue is covered adequately enough across the spectrum of services.</p> <p>Entire section with 7 specific recommendations on safe and legal abortion.</p> <p>Request for progress laws around abortions” as shown below:</p> <p>Recommendation 4.2.2: “To immediately repeal all laws criminalizing, penalizing and/or restricting access to abortion services whilst formulating new laws and policies as a means to allow better access”</p> <p>Addresses the issues of unsafe abortion as a factor that affects women’s health and safe motherhood providing offering prompt post abortion care and counselling for women.</p> <p>Safe Abortion services are also mentioned under the section of youth as priority area for their attainment of health as mentioned in Recommendation 6.3.13</p> <p>Lastly, abortion services are mentioned in the section that addressed the need for attainment for general Sexual and Reproductive Health Services i.e. Recommendation: 4.2.7</p>	<p>Mentioned: 9 times</p> <p>The document realises that “some experiences in the region have demonstrated that the penalization of abortion leads to higher rates of maternal mortality and morbidity and does not reduce the number of abortions”</p> <p>Therefore sees comprehensive post-abortion care as key in elimination of preventable cases of maternal morbidity and mortality. This is in line with Recommendation 40.</p> <p>It recommends that where abortions are legal and decriminalized, there must be good services in place with ensure that voluntary termination of pregnancies is upheld.</p>	<p>Mentioned: 8 times</p> <p>It promotes the need to follow WHO guidelines on safe abortion and post abortion care aimed at reducing maternal mortality.</p> <p>It approaches abortion by suggesting primary prevention of unintended pregnancies in order to “<i>eliminating the need</i>” for abortions with reference to ICPD POA paragraph 8.5</p> <p>The following are some of the recommendations provided in relation to abortion:</p> <p>Recommendation 35: “remove legal barriers preventing women and girls from access to safe abortion services”</p> <p>Recommendation 42: “Expand access for all women and adolescent girls to timely, humane and compassionate treatment of unsafe abortion complications and to quality safe abortion services”</p>
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<p>Forced sterilization</p>	<p>Mentioned: 4 times</p> <p>This section is covered in a section of its own. (Recommendation 4.3). The document calls for “Recommendation 4.3.1.:Develop, promote and implement policies and clear policy guidelines with regard to sterilisation that protect the rights of women and men, including LGBTI men and women, based on a human rights framework and ensuring informed consent and free choice”</p>	<p>Mentioned: Zero</p> <p>Nowhere in the document are the issues of forced sterilization covered as it may not be a regional problem as in Africa</p>	<p>Mentioned: 1 time</p> <p>The issue of sterilization is covered in the document on Recommendation 44: “while revising restrictions within existing sterilisation laws and policies to protect health and safeguard the lives of women and adolescent girls”</p>
<p>Migrant populations</p>	<p>Mentioned: 5 times</p> <p>This document views migrants as a key population. The needs of migrant workers in relation to Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights.</p> <p>Highlights the need to understand and provide SRHR services for migrants free from stigma and/or discrimination as well as highlighted in recommendation 6.6.13 and 6.6.14</p>	<p>Mentioned: 9 times</p> <p>The document has an entire section on “International Migration and Protection of human Rights of All Rights” which provides recommendations from Recommendation 66 to 75</p>	<p>Mentioned: 4 times</p> <p>The document discusses migrants and their rights in recommendation 15, 64 & 65. However, there is no reference to the health of migrants in the entire document</p>
<p>Sexual Orientation</p>	<p>Mentioned: 3 times</p> <p>Mentioned to ensure the provision of right to health (Recommendation 6.4.2) and the request for the need to monitor progress on programmes of implementation on health regardless of sexual orientation (Recommendation 6.4.6)</p>	<p>Mentioned: 3 times</p> <p>Mentions the promotion of sexual rights regardless of sexual orientation: Recommendation 34: “Promote policies that enable persons to exercise their sexual rights, which embrace the right to a safe and full sex life, as well as the right to take free, informed, voluntary and responsible decisions on their</p>	<p>Mentioned: 2 times</p> <p>The phrases is used twice to firstly for the guarantee of equality as provided in Recommendation 7 and later the need to for the promotion and protection of reproductive rights in recommendation 34</p>
